## **MONEY MAKES THE WORLD GO ROUND, BUT DRUGS CAN MAKE IT SPIN! PATIENT ASSESSMENT, DRUGS AND HERBAL INTERACTIONS**

### **This course is designed for dentists, hygienists, dental assistants and office staff.**

Did you know that more than 20% of hospital admissions are due to adverse drug reactions? Just because dentists prescribe less than 10% of all available drugs, your patients may be taking others from the 90% with which you are not familiar. Since polypharmacy is the norm, especially in the over 65 year old population, this course should be considered essential to every practice setting today.

Do you have patients who are already on one prescription medication before they come to your office? How about four prescription medications? Did you know that the likelihood of a drug interaction in a patient on five medications is greater than 50%? What if you are the prescriber who writes that fifth prescription? With so many new medications, herbal products, over-the-counter drugs, and supplements available on the market, how can you be confident that the prescription you write is compatible with what your patient is currently taking?

This interactive program looks at some of the more common drugs and drug interactions and their management with a particular focus on the dental realm. Case studies will augment the delivery of key points and a problem-based learning approach is encouraged so that each participant's questions are addressed. The program will conclude with an important update on appropriate antibiotic and analgesic prescribing. After all, when an adverse drug reaction occurs due to a drug interaction, who is more at risk – you or your patient?

- Describe the potential for drug-drug interactions and articulate strategies to avoid them.
- Understand the principles of drug metabolism including liver enzyme induction and inhibition.
- Describe at least three disease states attributable for induced metabolism and three disease states attributable for inhibited metabolism.

## ILLICIT DRUGS AND THE DENTAL PATIENT

### This course is designed for dentists, hygienists, dental assistants and office staff.

Drug abuse remains a major problem in our society. According to The National Survey on Drug Use and Health conducted by SAMSHA (Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration), between 2006 and 2008 an estimated 4.3 million (4.7%) adults aged 50 or older had used an illicit drug in the previous year. Moreover, the organization's combined data from 2002 to 2007 showed that over 8.3 million children (11.9%) lived with at least one parent who was dependent on or abused alcohol or an illicit drug during the past year. Among that population almost 2.1 million (3.0%) lived with a parent who was dependent on or abused illicit drugs. Young adults aged 18 to 25 have been shown to be the most likely to use methamphetamine.

Providing dental care to anxious, fearful and medically-complex patients continues to be a major challenge facing dentists. Now more than ever, dental professionals are faced with the additional challenge of treating these patients' oral health needs in the face of potential illicit drug use such that the simple approach to, "drilling and filling" has just been cranked up a few more notches. If substance abuse and dependence affects one in ten Americans, this means one in ten of your patients. This interactive program looks at some of these most challenging patients, their most common negative sequelae due to illicit drug use and the management of these patients with a particular focus on the dental realm. Case studies will augment the delivery of key points and a problem-based learning approach is encouraged so that each participant's questions are addressed. Most importantly, you will learn directly applicable strategies to successfully treat these medically-complex patients on Monday morning. After all, our goal is to make sure all dental appointments are not just successful for your patient, but also for you and your staff.

- Describe the risk factors to consider when treating patients who use illicit drugs.
- Recognize some of the oral signs of illicit drug use and how to better manage these patients.
- Learn how to help make all of your appointments successful for you, your Team and your patients.

## IMPROVING THE ORAL HEALTH OF YOUR OLDER PATIENTS

With the baby boom generation reaching 65 years and beyond, this is the first generation of Americans to reach older adulthood with an almost intact natural dentition. While keeping our teeth as we age is a positive trend, increasing lifespans can also result in the onset of chronic conditions, long-term medication usage, and oral diseases that can create complex dental treatment needs and questions on the part of dental professionals on how to care for this population.

Most dentists today received very little formal training in caring for the unique needs of older patients. WDS Foundation engaged a team of national experts in serving older adults, led by Dr. Linda Niessen, DMD, MPH, to develop a course that discusses the importance of treating the oral health needs of independently-living older adults in your office. This course is targeted to general dentists to expand their expertise in delivering optimal dental care to this diverse, and growing, senior population who needs care. The course will include patient cases and discussion to assess treatment options based on the patient's goals, ability to pay, health status, etc. The course is designed to build confidence in treating older patients, understand patient care options, and increase access to dental care for older adults.

- Understand the importance of serving older patients and the growing population of patients that need care.
- Understand how oral health issues change with age.
- Enhance understanding in managing the interactions between oral conditions and overall health and the importance of prevention at every age and stage of health.

## PERI-IMPLANTITIS: LATEST UPDATES ON ITS DEFINITION, PREVENTION AND TREATMENT

### This course is designed for dentists, and hygienists

Peri-implantitis has been receiving attention following recent studies that showed that it is highly prevalent and difficult to manage. This course will provide the latest evidence-based information on peri-implant diseases with emphasis on a team/interdisciplinary approach to treatment.

The program will present the updates on the definition and etiology of peri-implantitis from the American Academy of Periodontology's 2018 consensus meeting. The instructors will present research findings on risk factors for peri-implant disease and preventive measures to incorporate into the implant treatment plan prior to implant placement that include implant treatment planning, material selection for cementation, restorative design and maintenance. In addition, the program will review innovative therapeutic protocols for disease prevention and treatment and recent advancements in implant cleaning instruments and chemotherapeutics.

### Course Objectives - At the conclusion of the course the participant should be able to:

- Define peri-implantitis and diagnostic criteria.
- Explain to a patient the risk factors for development of peri-implant disease.
- Formulate an assessment and maintenance strategy for all phases of implant treatment.

### Afternoon Workshop – Attendance limited to 12 participants

The hands on section of the program will be held in the dental school clinics where a limited number of attendees will have the opportunity to get direct instruction on the use of implant-specific instruments for peri-implantitis therapy. The instrumentation will be performed on mannequins under the guidance of the instructors. Hand-outs with detailed implant therapy and maintenance protocol will be given to the participants and reviewed with the instructors.

This program will be presented by DRS. DAUBERT and KOTSAKIS who are both faculty members in the Department of Periodontics and investigators in the Clinical and Periodontal Research lab. Their lab is a leading research center for peri-implantitis nationally and they both frequently lecture on peri-implantitis research nationally and internationally.

In addition, we will create a road map of overhead expenditures and projected income, which will allow you to know the exact costs to operate your practice each month and, of course your projected cash flow.

### Winning at the Insurance Game

- **Proper Coding:** You will be able to implement systems for all providers by accountability of verifying end of day sheets. You can begin to prepare your practice for the future and how the medical world will intertwine with the dental.

### For cancellations:

You have two options if you cancel.
