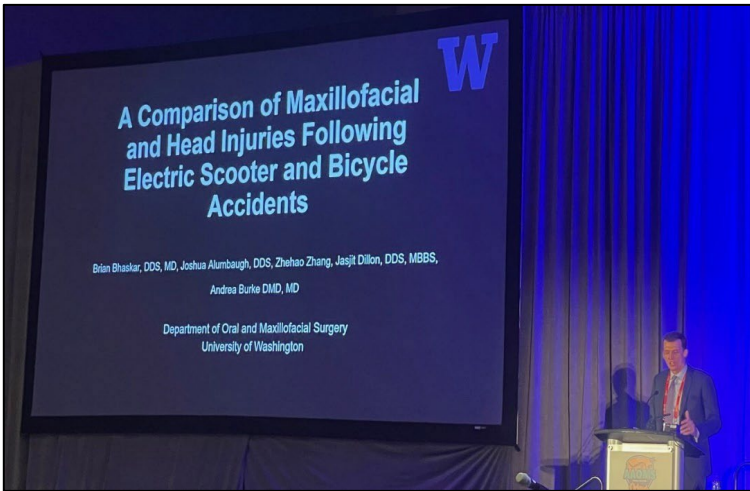


Fig. 2 (above) Dr. Brian Bhaskar presenting at AAOMS annual meeting

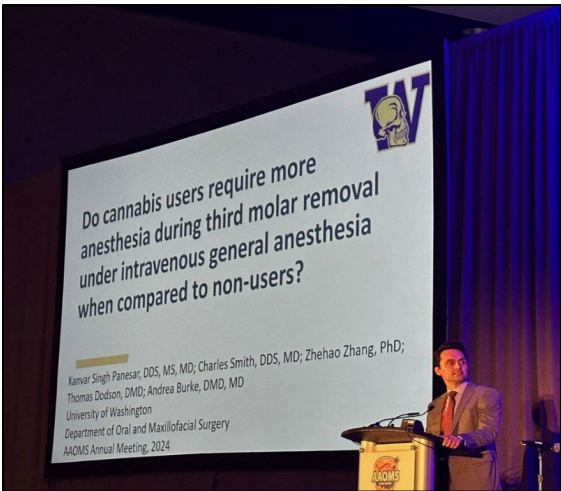


Figure 3 (above) Dr. Charlie Smith presenting at AAOMS annual meeting. Dr. Smith received an award for one of the best oral abstracts presented at the meeting.

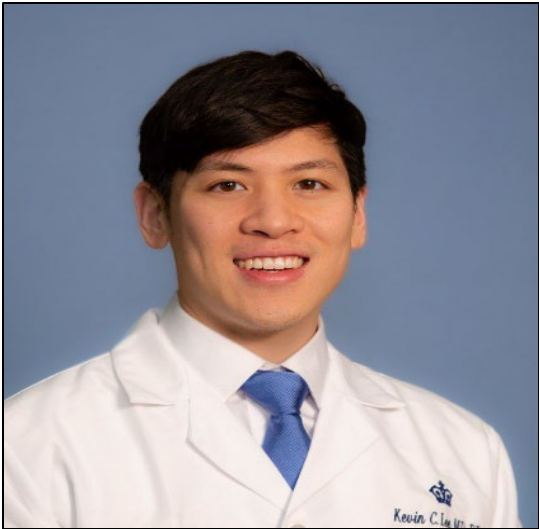


Figure 5 (above) – Dr. Kevin C. Lee

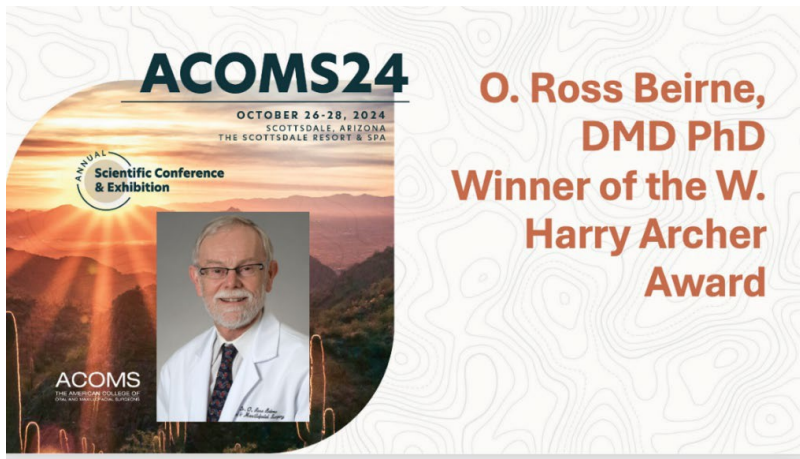
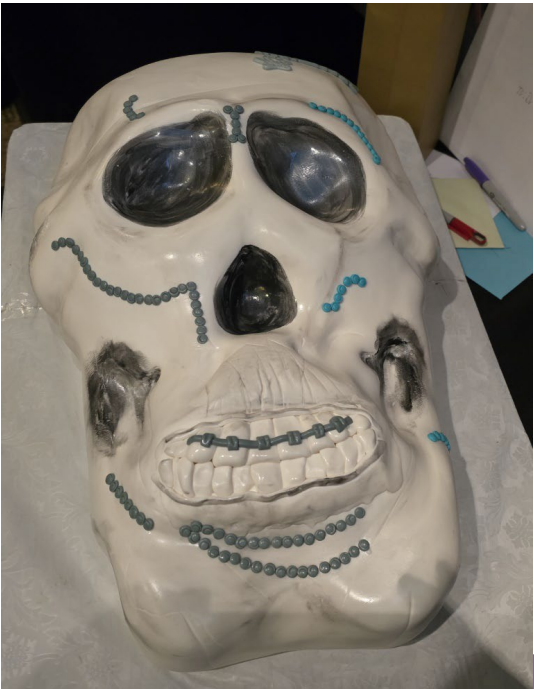


Fig. 7 Dr. Ross Beirne recognized with ABOMS Archer Award

PRE-DOCTORAL ACTIVITIES

Dr. John Evans

The second week in November 2024, the School of Dentistry was visited by a team from the Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA). Every seven years dental schools in the United States must undergo this process to maintain their status as an accredited educational institution.

Preparing for the site visit took the faculty, administration and students two years. Our finished document runs to many thousands of pages. It includes everything from the efficacy of the curriculum to the financial status of the School of Dentistry to the subjective evaluation of the school by our students. The site visitors met personally with faculty, staff and students including the President of the University. The final report will be sent to us next fall, but the indications are that we did well compared to other dental schools. Our residency program is evaluated on a different schedule, so it was not part of the process.

We instituted something new this year. The school (and all other accredited dental schools) now administer competency examinations that must be passed by all students prior to graduation. Our department is responsible for four patient-based competency exams: local anesthesia, hard and soft tissue surgery and nitrous oxide sedation. This requires that we observe and evaluate 280 separate procedures done by our students. This takes, as you might imagine, a lot of time as students negotiate the fourth year of our curriculum.

The scope of the surgical curriculum for pre-doctoral students has expanded over the years. We currently are responsible for teaching basic biomedical sciences to one degree or another in all four years of the curriculum. We run a pre-doctoral surgery clinic, the Oral Surgery Clerkship and the local anesthesia and nitrous oxide courses for third year students. We supervise the surgery done in our clinic by fourth year students and teach two required courses in that year: A review of the pharmacology of commonly used drugs along with the didactics associated with patient evaluation and monitoring of sedated patients. The second half that course looks at the pharmacology of commonly abused licit and illicit drugs. So, we have a good-sized footprint in the pre-doctoral curriculum.

We have always provided a robust surgical curriculum for our pre-doctoral students and that continues. It has been my pleasure to participate in teaching the surgical curriculum since 1984. We could not have done it without the generous participation of our affiliate faculty. You know who you are. I would like to thank all of you for sharing your time and expertise with our students. Our department has a legacy to be proud of.
