In preparation for the match, we interviewed a high caliber cohort of candidates over 2 days. While the number of candidates applying for OMS residency continues to decline nationally, we continue to see strong applicants.

We received 140 applications, screened 80, and interviewed 30 applicants, in-person, no longer virtually. I am pleased to report that we matched 3 applicants to the resident class matriculating in July 2027, Mr. Youngmin Park and Ms. Nicole Ke Lin from Columbia College of Dental Medicine and Mr. Julian Meilleur from Louisiana State University. Also matriculating in July are four non-categorical interns: Mr. Andrew Chen (UW GPR, 2025), Mr. Andrew Nguyen (California Northstate University), Ms. Savannah Thaw (Boston University), and Karanbir Sidhu (University of Saskatchewan, Canada).

We would like to welcome Dr. Robert Ly to our program. He transferred to the program from the LSU-Shreveport training program and started his rotations in July 2025.

Drs. Shawn Griffin, Cole Gardner, and Tim Park completed their first six months of OMS training and will enter medical school in January 2026. Drs. Christopher Steiner, Doug Yuan, and Kevin Yu are expected to graduate from medical school, May 2026. Drs. Joshua Alumbaugh, Michael Snow, Christopher Ma, Isabella Galina, and Jay Park are off service completing their general surgery training. After completing their general surgery rotations, we welcomed back Dr. Treyvon Foy, Taylor Ellingseh, and Jessica Van as they rejoined the OMS resident team in July. This year marked a significant milestone for the program with our CODA accreditation site visit. While we are still awaiting the formal written report, the site visitors informed us at the conclusion of the visit that the program is approved with no recommendations. This outstanding outcome is a testament to the hard work, dedication, and commitment of our faculty, staff, and leadership. We are incredibly proud of this accomplishment and grateful to everyone who contributed to the process. A special thanks goes out to our Program Manager, Lani Jodlowski, and Assistant Program Director, Ivy Lin. They were both crucial to our success and put forth a tremendous amount of extra work to complete the Self-Study and prepare for the site visit.

We have also completed our resident recruitment cycle. This year, we interviewed 24 applicants and made the decision to go non-Match. Through this process, we are excited to welcome eight excellent future residents who will be joining our program. The applicant pool was strong, and we are confident this incoming class will be a great fit for our program and continue our tradition of clinical excellence.

In addition, we would like to extend our sincere appreciation to two new volunteers, Brian Baik and Theresa Madden. Their generosity with their time, skills, and support plays an important role in our program’s success and in the care we provide for our patients. They bring abundant experience in general dentistry and periodontics. We are truly grateful for their continued involvement.

PRE-DOCTORAL ACTIVITIES

Dr. John Evans

We are entering 2026 with the implementation of major curriculum revision in the School of Dentistry. The change has been in the making for two years and is approved by the Curriculum Committee and other leadership committees within the school. The content of the surgical curriculum will not change. It will remain robust. The teaching methods we plan to use will be different to some degree.

The changes:

1. Our student contact hours will not decrease but we will be returning, for better or worse, to the large lecture model of didactic instruction. We will be presenting the didactic curriculum to eighty students at a time instead of twenty-five.
2. The size of our classes is increasing significantly. We are now graduating eighty students per year. Up from seventy.

3. We are adopting technologies and methods of instruction that were not available in the past. We strive to maintain face-to-face contact with our students. For example, we now have learning management systems that automate administrative tasks. Faculty are free to teach students in the clinic rather than enter grades and figure out class averages. We can produce teaching modules that contain links to pertinent articles in the literature. With a click, students can pull up the latest on osteonecrosis, for example.
4. The school is moving to a "Practice Group" patient care model. We have established five groups of third- and fourth-year students—roughly thirty-two of them per group, who will treat a common pool of patients. The goals are two. First, we will be able to offer patients comprehensive, timely care, and second, we will be able to better distribute cases to students who need to finish requirements and get competency examinations done prior to graduation. I will run one of the practice groups.
5. We are seeing as many patients as we can now. This is a welcome change from the COVID hangover. It seems there are many, many patients in need of minor surgical care in our communities. We will, however, resist becoming an emergency toothache clinic. There is more to dentoalveolar surgery, as you all know, than removing painful teeth.

We have plenty to do and can always use the help of interested affiliate faculty. Our students appreciate "real world" wisdom.
