Our clinic volumes are close to exceeding pre-pandemic levels. Operating rooms are full. Residents and faculty are busy with research (see pages 6-7) and clinical care. Life is almost back to normal.



June 17th, we celebrated the graduation of

the second class of dually-trained oral and maxillofacial surgeons, Drs. Jesse Han, Nicholas Smiley, and Phillip Hurst (see figure 1). We are proud to send them out into the world as well-trained surgeons ready to make valuable contributions to their patients, practices, and community. Joining them at graduation was their co-residents, incoming interns, and faculty (see figure 2).

A mark of a program's excellence is the national and international reputation of its faculty and alumni. And we are well-represented. Dr. Jasjit Dillon was appointed to the Board of Directors of the Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery (OMS) Foundation and continued executive leadership roles in the Washington State Society of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons (WSSOMS) and the American Academy of Craniomaxillofacial Surgeons. Dr. Andrea Burke is a member of the AAOMS Committee on Research Planning and Technology Advancement. Dr. Melanie Lang serves as a Seattle-King County Dental Society delegate to the WSDA House of Delegates, a consultant to the ADA Council on Scientific Affairs, an AAOMS representative to the ADA Antibiotic Therapeutics Guidelines Development Panel, and a member of the ADA's Medical Advisory Committee. Dr. Mark Eqbert is vice-president of AAOMS. Dr. John Evans was nominated to receive the Laskin Predoctoral Educator's Award. I was appointed to be Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery on January 1, 2022.

UW OMS graduates and faculty comprised much of the most recent Torch (Spring 2022) publication of the OMS Foundation. As noted above, Dr. Dillon is the newest member of the OMSF's board of directors. The Torch featured two of our graduates for their philanthropy, Drs. David Ludwig and Pete Gauger. Dr. Ross Beirne and his wife, Sheryl, were highlighted for their many years of service to OMS and WSSOMS. In a matter of weeks, in recognition of Ross' and Sheryl's years of service, WSSOMS membership of WSSOMS raised over \$100,000 to contribute to the OMS Foundation in support of its education and research mission!

The Philip Worthington Lectureship in Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery was established in 2003 by a passionate, committed group of stakeholders in the Department of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery who wished to honor and recognize the profound contributions of Dr. Worthington to the Department after more than 20 years of leadership and service. Since then, proceeds from this fund have brought to the University of Washington numerous distinguished scholars in the field of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery, or other fields where new developments impact upon the practice of OMS. The contributions of these scholars have been of great benefit to oral surgery faculty, residents, and other post-doctoral students each year. In view of the excellent response to honoring Dr. Worthington and to meet the strategic challenges of maintaining a sustainable OMS department, we are working to expand the fund to provide for an Endowed Chair in Dr. Worthington's name.

An Endowed Chair in OMS is critical for several important reasons:

- It signifies the importance of OMS to the School of Dentistry

- The commitment of an endowed leadership position is important in retaining the best candidates, who are commonly recruited to consider other positions as they become available

Thanks to the financial contributions from generous OMS alumni and stakeholders, I am pleased to announce that we have reached almost 90 percent of the University's threshold for an Endowed Chair, so we are tantalizingly close to this goal! PRE-DOCTORAL ACTIVITIES

The more things change, the more they stay the same. This describes the pre-doctoral teaching program at this time. We have all experienced massive changes in the way we care for patients in the last three years. The pre-doctoral program is no exception. On again, off again restrictions on our clinics, use and abuse of N-95 masks, the transition from restricted access to patients seeking surgical care to nearly unrestricted access based on self-report of symptoms, and wave after wave of infectious variants have brought us to a new normal. However, it is fair to say that we have adapted and adapted again as we make our way through the pandemic.

Our mission has not changed. We are still teaching basic oral and maxillofacial surgery to pre-doctoral students. Our students are smart, motivated, and generally a pleasure to teach. We can, at this point, meet students in classrooms without masks. And there is the inevitable series of last-minute COVID absences that need accommodation. I am personally tired of ZOOM, but it does allow us when needed to continue, if less effectively, the teaching program as we work through the various issues day to day.

We have always tried to produce graduates who are good at routine dentoalveolar surgery. That goal has been difficult to reach during the past three years, but we have done it.

As always, we rely on affiliate faculty to help us get the job done. Thanks to you all who have been or continue to be involved with our teaching program. Students appreciate hearing from real world surgeons. We have had several students go on to OMS residencies based on conversations they have had with affiliates. Thanks so much to all of you who have helped us in the past. Those of you who may want to participate in the future, please let me know and we will find a time for you to get involved.

We anticipate beginning a new academic year this fall. The Oral Surgery Clerkship will proceed as it did last year. We will have a new Dean and begin the formal self-study in preparation for the next accreditation cycle in 2024. There is plenty going on. As always, we appreciate your interest in the predoctoral program.


