On June 30th, we celebrated the third class of graduating, dually-trained oral and maxillofacial surgeons, Drs. Rachel Lim, Kanvar Panesar, and Onyi Esonu (see Figure 1). Among this latest batch of graduates, we have veterans—survivors, if you will—of assorted lockdowns, OR closures, and severely challenged medical school rotations due to the COVID-19 pandemic. And despite these unprecedented hurdles, we graduated 3 well-trained, competent oral and maxillofacial surgeons. The department hosted graduation at a new venue, the Touchdown Terrace at Husky Stadium, with over 100 guests—co-residents, incoming interns, faculty, and staff—in attendance. It was a warm and nostalgic engagement enjoyed by all. On behalf of the department, I want to thank Lani Jodlowski and Dr. Sujit Joginpally for their efforts in coordinating the graduation event (see figure 2).



Evidence of our program's continued excellence is the regional, national, and international reputation of our faculty. We are honored that our own Dr. Mark Egbert has been elected to serve as the next AAOMS president. He will begin his presidential term at the AAOMS annual meeting in San Diego. Dr. Jasjit Dillon, Professor and OMS program director, was appointed the pathology section editor of the Journal of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery. She continues her leadership roles as a member of the Board of Directors of the OMS Foundation and a member of the Executive Committee of American Academy of Craniomaxillofacial Surgeons. Dr. Melanie Lang, Associate Professor, was elected to the WSDA Board of Directors and continues her work as a consultant to the ADA Council on Scientific Affairs. Dr. Andrea Burke serves on the AAOMS Committee on Research Planning and Technology Advancement and contributes actively to the AAOMS-sponsored Women in OMS Special Interest Group.

Dr. Lalani joins us after 20 years of private practice in Houston. He brings a wealth of clinical experience and knowledge of practice management to the group, as well as a strong research background. Although he only joined our faculty in April, it already seems like he has always been a part of our team.

On a personal note, the graduation event marked my 10th graduation here at UW. I couldn't be prouder of what this department has become. I dare anyone to find a stronger oral and maxillofacial surgery department anywhere in the US, whether it's in clinical expertise, research output, quality of training, or national leadership. And today, we are also among the strongest and financially most productive departments in the School of Dentistry. The department's success is a team effort. I am most grateful to the faculty, the affiliates, the residents, and particularly the alumni, for the trust and unwavering support you have given us.

A quick word about our research program. The School of Dentistry publishes around 100 papers each year. Our service, which is composed almost entirely of clinicians who see patients 3-5 days a week and do research mainly after 5 pm and on weekends, accounts for roughly 30% of the school's total output of published research. When national rankings of dental schools are published, the major driver of those rankings is the school's body of published research and the citations derived from those publications.

I want to recognize and thank the affiliate faculty who help to provide service and teach the students and residents at the School of Dentistry, VA Hospital, Seattle Children's Hospital, Harborview Medical Center, and Northwest Center for Oral and Facial Surgery – the School of Dentistry's faculty/resident practice. Affiliates make us greater than the sum of our parts. I would like to recognize one of our former residents, Dr. Sapna Lohiya, for being recognized as one of the ADA's "Ten under Ten" Honorees this year! Dr. Lohiya graduated from the OMS residency program in 2017. Dr. Lohiya is an oral and maxillofacial surgeon in Los Angeles, a clinical instructor for the UCLA School of Dentistry, and the president-elect of the Western Los Angeles Dental Society.

The Philip Worthington Lectureship in Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery was established in 2003 by a passionate, committed group of stakeholders in the Department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery who wished to honor and recognize the profound contributions of Dr. Worthington, who passed away August 13, 2022, to the Department after more than 20 years of leadership and service. Since then, proceeds from this fund have brought to the University of Washington numerous distinguished scholars in the field of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery, or other fields where new developments impact upon the practice of OMS. The contributions of these scholars have been of great benefit to oral surgery faculty, residents, and other post-doctoral students each year.

The 2023 Worthington Invited Lecturer is Dr. Peter Waite, Professor, University of Alabama-Birmingham. He will provide an update on obstructive sleep apnea. The lecture will be delivered live and online, November 1, 2023.

In view of the excellent response to honoring Dr. Worthington and to meet the strategic challenges of maintaining a sustainable OMS department, we pledged to expand the fund to provide for an Endowed Chair in Dr. Worthington's name.

An Endowed Chair in OMS is critical for several important reasons:

- It signifies the importance of OMS to the School of Dentistry
- It ensures that funding is available in perpetuity for the transition of high-caliber leadership from one generation to the next
- It offers a competitive edge nationally when recruiting the best from among a limited qualified pool of candidates by underscoring the resources and economic stability of the UW
- The commitment of an endowed leadership position is important in retaining the best candidates, who are commonly recruited to consider other positions as they become available

Thanks to the financial contributions from generous OMS alumni and stakeholders, I am pleased to announce that we have reached the University's threshold for an Endowed Chair! We are delighted that the OMS community heeded Dr. Dodson's challenge to reach this goal before the 1-year anniversary of Dr. Worthington's passing. It is a testament to the strength of UW's OMS Department that its alumni continue their generosity in support of the OMS Department.

PRE-DOCTORAL ACTIVITIES

Dr. John Evans

Our predoctoral program is full speed this summer offering clinical surgical services utilizing our fourth- year students. We are treating more difficult cases since all senior students have completed the Oral and Maxillofacial

Surgery Clerkship in their third year. We accept most cases requiring simple and surgical extractions as well as patients in need of pre-prosthetic surgery. Straightforward patients with minor pathology are also evaluated and treated.

We are running our usual course introducing local anesthesia to second-year students which is always a favorite. We have moved the clinical component to the third year to eliminate the delay between instruction and actual clinical practice.

Beyond that we are providing review lectures on treating medical emergencies in the dental office for both third- and fourth-year students. We run all third-year students through a review course in the administration of local anesthesia which includes a clinical component. The use of nitrous oxide is presented with clinical instruction in preparation for the start of the OMS Clerkship in Autumn quarter.

Fourth-year students are getting a course in minimal conscious sedation from Dr. Ross Beirne and an update on the pharmacology of the drugs we administer to patients including opioids. Beyond that we are reviewing the drugs used to treat the common diseases with which our patient present. Included in this segment are the common drugs used to treat the psychological and psychiatric illnesses we see daily, and three lectures on the pharmacology of common illicit drugs our patient may take before a dental appointment. Then there is a new three-lecture series on the pharmacology of drugs implicated in osteonecrosis. This is a busy summer for sure.

The whole faculty is involved with preparing the School of Dentistry for the next site visit by the Committee on Dental Accreditation (CODA). This process involves an active review of the entire predoctoral program. There is an extensive self-study, needed modifications to our academic and clinical programs, and the writing of a final accreditation document. Add this to an already full academic calendar and we have, indeed, an active summer. Comments and suggestions are welcome as usual.
